Use of the Blue Star Canteen and/or grounds by vetted and approved outside groups

Section 1. The canteen is a part of New York Chapter 1 and Blue Star Mothers of America, Inc.'s mission. Any use of the canteen or grounds by an outside group is not to be encouraged. Requests for use of the BSMA, Inc. NY1 Chapter Canteen must be submitted in writing or via email to recsec.ny1@bluestarmothers.us. there may be a few exceptions which must be vetted before being approved by the Chapter Board of Directors at a CEB meeting and by the membership at a chapter meeting before approval is given for use. Should there be an urgent request received, the Chapter President (CP) may use email to contact members of the CEB. Upon CEB approval, the CP may use email to contact the membership. All requests, meeting minutes, emails and/or responses should be sent to the Recording Secretary for her records.

Section 2. An approved group of no more than 25 people, must have a current certificate of insurance, naming the BSMA Chapter 1 as an additional insured, on file with BSMA, NY Chapter 1 Recording Secretary, prior to their use of the canteen and/or grounds.

Section 3. No parking in the Dentist Office parking lot unless the dental office is closed for the day.

Section 4. A Blue Star Mother is required to be constantly present during the entire use of the Canteen and/or grounds or the event cannot take place. Accessing the canteen will be by the back door only. The front door is not to be used. The Blue Star Mother attending will unlock the back door for the group and will be responsible for locking the door at the end of the meeting. She will also make sure lights are turned off and the alarm is set before leaving.

Section 5. There are to be no firearms, weapons, smoking, vaping, alcohol, or drug use in the canteen or on the grounds of the canteen.

Section 6. The upstairs, the pantry and its content, and all kitchen appliances including the stove, are off limits. Groups may bring in their own snacks or non-alcoholic beverages.

Section 7. Groups are required to leave the canteen, including the bathroom, clean after their meeting and take trash with them.

Section 8. A copy of these rules must be posted in the Canteen kitchen at all times.

Section 9. Violations of any of these rules will result in use of the canteen and/or grounds being revoked.

Section 10. A copy of these rules will be given to any approved group prior to their use of the canteen or grounds.


More from Joyce Mader about the Memorial Day Service in Cheshire:

At the Cheshire Volunteer Fire Depart Memorial Day Program, Jed Simpson, the Town Supervisor, spoke about what Memorial Day meant to him and told the story of finding letters from his Great-Uncle who served in WW1. He found a book where his uncle wrote in the margins about the various battles and mentioned the names of his brothers-in-arms who had been killed or wounded. He wrote about going through the meadows of France and Belgium, and how the Germans were strafing the fields with machine gun fire. The uncle had been shot

in the head but survived. Unfortunately, someone told his family that he had died while he, very much alive, was in-route back to the US at the end of the War. His parents and kin were overjoyed when he returned.

Pam Helming, our NY State Senator and a friend to Chapter #1, was also in Cheshire to remind everyone why we were there. They had a wonderful singer and a local Chaplain. Joyce spoke about Blue Star Mothers: how the organization came into being, where it all started, how long we have been around, and what exactly we do for our deployed Service People, our Veterans and the Military Families on the home front. There were children there as well, taking it all in and learning what we owe to those who lay down their lives for all of the rest of us. It was a moving program.

People then went to the nearby cemetery to place a wreath on the monument for the Civil War Soldiers whose remains are scattered everywhere. A local lady recited the Gettysburg Address, and another woman played the guitar. We all sang America, the Beautiful. There was a gun salute from the Canandaigua American Legion in honor of the deceased, and the Chaplain closed with a benediction. It was a glorious day: warm, sunny, blooming everywhere with flowers, and trees in bud. In a way, it was heartbreaking as those who purchased our freedom had to leave sunshine and birdsong behind forever. They strongly believed in what they were doing to secure the future for themselves, their families and descendants.

"A Hero Was Here" is the tag line for the site honoring the military service of SGT John "Kyle" Daggett, US Army.

Kyle was mortally injured during the battle for Sadr City, Iraq. He would die two weeks later, in Halifax, Canada (en-route to Walter Reed National MC in MD), with his family by his side on May 15, 2008.

The Stryker vehicle he and his patrol were in came under RPG attack. The two soldiers in the rear gun wells, Kyle & SPC Shane Stuard, took the brunt of the attack.

With May being Armed Forces Appreciation Month, please take a moment to remember all who have served, especially those that made the "ultimate sacrifice".





That's Sgt. John "Kyle" Daggett, 22, Airborne Army Ranger from Phoenix, AZ. He died from injuries sustained when an airburst mortar exploded over the armored vehicle he was traveling in. Daggett was in the rear gun hatch, exposed, along with another soldier when the explosion occurred in Baghdad. Sgt. Daggett's injuries were overwhelming yet he made it from Baghdad to Germany to Halifax, Nova Scotia, where he finally succumbed.

Sgt. Daggett's died a hero. And that, after the mortar exploded, the driver of the vehicle who recovered enough to drive "like a bat out of hell to the evac site, taking out vehicles, utility poles and anything else in his way" was Spc. James McCarthy.

SPC Shane Stuard, a father of three, who was riding alongside Sgt. Daggett, recovered from his injuries while at Walter Reed Army Medical Center.

I'm anti-war. I think any sane person is. But I am pro-soldier ... because war is the worst thing on this earth and soldiers know it and they choose to do it anyway — so the rest of us don't have to.

Once in a room with four Vietnam veterans and a Desert Storm veteran. The conversation centered on Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder and the realities of being a soldier. At one point, the Desert Storm vet looked me in the eye and asked, "How come you never served your country?" There was no malice in the asking, but all conversation stopped and everyone waited for an answer. I had no answer that seemed adequate so I told the truth, "I made the choice to avail myself of the freedoms that you have fought to provide me ... Thank you." And one of the Vietnam vets stuck out a hand and said, "Fair enough. You're welcome."

Remember the cost of freedom.
